Level of Excellence Award

Each year, councils and chapters may request to be recognized for one of two Levels of Excellence awards. The very, very best councils or chapters receive a five-star award, and above-average councils or chapters receive a four-star award.

A standard set of rating criteria are used to evaluate all councils and chapters that submit a package. Those accumulating at least 220 of the maximum 240 total possible points will be recognized appropriately as five-star, and organizations accumulating between 200 and 219 points will be recognized as four-star.

All councils and chapters qualifying for a particular level of excellence will be recognized appropriately and given a special battle streamer in recognition of their selection.

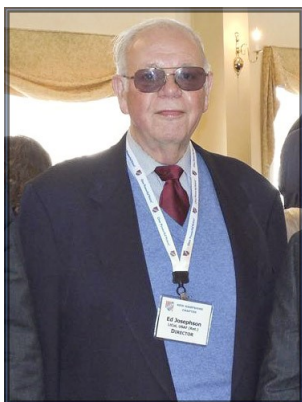

BRENTWOOD - With his family at his side, Edward H. Josephson "slipped the surly bonds of earth" at Massachusetts General Hospital Sunday, Sept. 4, 2016. Ed was air-lifted from Wentworth Douglas Hospital in Dover, to Mass General (Boston).

Growing up in Concord, Ed enjoyed hunting and fishing, his paper route, frequently visiting the NH Historical Building, and being in the Civil Air Patrol which nourished his love of flight.

During his senior year at Concord High School he learned of the new "U.S. Air Force Academy" which would be accepting candidates for its first-year classes. Ed wrote a letter to newly elected Congressman Perkins Bass and and delighted to be subsequently appointed.

While flying transport planes for the USAF, Ed visited all 50 states then onto several countries (including all continents).

Following AF retirement Ed joined AVCO which became the Textron Systems Division. He was promoted to V.P. Ombudsman, a term and job that he thoroughly enjoyed. Ed had been a strong and busy advocate for many veteran groups in the state throughout many years.

He leaves his wife, Judith (Judy Coates from Tampa, Fla.) of 53 years, son (Edward Andrew from Charleston, S.C.), and granddaughter (Monica Louise Josephson of Bayreuth, Germany, (now residing in Bucksport, Maine).

MOAA News:

May 13, 2016

On May 12, the Senate Armed Services Committee approved its version of the FY 2017 Defense Authorization Bill. Committee leaders left no doubt about their determination to address problems in beneficiary access and program efficiency, quality, oversight, and contracting in several areas including specific health matters.

They also left no doubt they believe many fees associated with TRICARE should be increased.

That combination of views is best described by a sentence in the committee's press release that said, "[These] reform initiatives adhere to a simple guiding principle: that beneficiaries should only be asked to pay more into a military system that delivers greater value."

Changes addressed by the committee include:

- ** eliminating preauthorization requirements for specialty care
 - ** lowering copays for high-value medications and services
 - ** requiring a plan to improve pediatric care
 - ** requiring a standardized appointment system in military facilities
 - ** establishing performance accountability standards for military health care leaders at all levels
 - ** incorporating value-based methods and provider reimbursements in TRICARE contracts
 - ** expanding telehealth services
 - ** Authority for TRICARE beneficiaries to enroll in the federal civilian dental and vision programs;
